Microdermabrasion Timmins - Dermatitis Herpetiformis is often abbreviated as DH or otherwise referred to as Duhring's Disease. It is a chronic skin condition that is characterized by blisters which are filled with a watery fluid. The name itself translates to meaning that it is a skin condition having an appearance like herpes, although, DH is not caused by or related to the herpes virus. DH was first described during the year 1884 by Dr. Louis Duhring, thus the name. In the year 1867, a correlation between celiac disease or gluten intolerance and DH was recognized. In nearly all of cases, the age of onset is typically 15 to 40 years, although, DH could likewise have an effect on the elderly as well as kids. Men and women are likewise affected. The prevalence of DH varies from 1 in 400 to 1 in 10,000.

Signs

Dermatitis Herpetiformis has a characteristic rash that contains chronic papulovesicular eruptions, which are intensely itchy. This particular kind of rash is usually distributed symmetrically on extensor surfaces such as the back of neck, elbows, knees, back and the buttocks. The blisters can vary from being up to 1 cm across to really small. Since this particular condition is very itchy intensive, the need to scratch could be overwhelming. This could cause the individual to actually scratch blisters off before they could be checked by a doctor of medicine. Intense itching or intense burning sensation are occasionally felt prior to blisters appearing in a specific place.

The severity of Dermatitis Herpetiformis can vary in time if left untreated. Quite often, the initial signs appear in early adulthood, between the ages of 20 and 30 years old. The very first visible symptoms are the small vesicles or papules that resemble bumps or blisters. The initial signs are intensive burning and itching. Normally, the first blisters appear on the shoulders, on the lower end of the spinal column, along the hairline and sometimes within the mouth. Rarely, does the rash happen on various mucous membranes other than the mouth or the lips. If gluten ingestion is prevented and the right treatment is provided, the symptoms normally disappear. In various cases, taking oral contraceptives may worsen the indications.

The signs of DH tend to come and go, in short periods of time, yet are always chronic. These signs can be accompanied by abdominal pain and fatigue and some symptoms of celiac disease.

The rash that is caused by DH forms and disappears in 3 stages. At first, the individual may see a slight discoloration of the skin where the lesions appear. Next, the skin lesions transform into obvious vesicles and papules that are likely to happen in groups. The healing stage of the lesions is the final stage of development. Often this set of indications is characterized by a skin color change. This may lead to areas of the skin turning darker or lighter compared to the color of the skin elsewhere on the body. Because of the intense itching, people generally scratch which could result in the formation of crusts.
